Nurses comprise the largest proportion of the global TB workforce and are essential to global TB elimination efforts. Progress towards TB elimination requires a nursing workforce that can deliver best-practice, evidence-based care to achieve optimal treatment outcomes and prevent the emergence and spread of TB. To underpin practice, drive change and innovation, nurses undertake research. Nursing research identifies areas where there may be gaps in knowledge, and where current practices may be outdated or ineffective, prompting the need for new approaches in policy and practice. By investigating new technologies, treatment, models of care and program advocacy, nursing researchers contribute to the evolution of healthcare delivery. In this webinar nursing research groups will share their experiences in research activities and outcomes to support TB elimination efforts in Australia and the pacific region.
